39, PAP


Expected to contest:

He has also held other senior positions in DBS, such as regional chief operating officer, chief financial officer of the institutional banking group and the regional head of finance, group planning and analytics.

Prior to DBS, Mr Goh had held senior finance roles at American Express, in markets including Paris, London and New York.

Mr Goh is the vice chairman of the Gambas-Yishun Citizens' Consultative Committee (CCC).



Don Wee Boon Hong



Mr Wee is a senior vice president at UOB. He has been cited as one of the candidates who took an unconventional route to success. Mr Wee, who grew up in a rental flat, chose to pursue a polytechnic diploma so that he could enter the workforce earlier. He subsequently joined a local bank as a non-executive staff member and pursued an accounting degree part-time.

Mr Wee later became a chartered accountant and also earned two Master's degrees, including one in public administration from the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy.

Ms Wong decided to enter politics after seeing others grapple with the rising cost of living. She flew back to Singapore after being contacted by Dr Tan Cheng Bock in March.

She had humble beginnings and took up three jobs when she was 17 to fund part-time courses.


Jose Raymond

Mr Raymond is founder and chief strategy officer of public relations firm SW Strategies. He plans to contest Potong Pasir SMC, the former stronghold of ex-SPP leader Chiam See Tong.



As a journalist, he covered the Sri Lanka conflict in 2000 and the RSS Courageous patrol vessel collision in Singapore in 2003.

Mr Raymond then went on to become the deputy director of Sport Singapore for media relations and social media. He was also chief executive of the Singapore Environment Council.

Today, he is founder and chief executive of private equity firm Timbre Capital.


Louis Chua


Mariam Jaafar

Under his leadership, IHH has grown its presence to 12 countries worldwide.

Dr Tan is presently a corporate advisor to Temasek Holdings and an advisor to DBS. He is also an independent director at SuryaJurong.

He said that he has spent two years of mentorship under Emeritus Senior Minister Goh Chok Tong, including working with Mr Goh on a caregiver support network for the elderly.

Mr Lim is an associate professor of economics at ESSEC Business School and chief economist at investment management firm Thirdrock Group.

He holds a PhD in international economics and a master's degree in politics from the University of California, Santa Cruz. He also holds master's degrees from Harvard

University and the London School of Economics.

Before entering academia, he spent three years doing portfolio management as an economist at the Abu Dhabi Investment Authority.

He also worked on international development at the World Bank for seven years.
