How commemorative coins are made at the Singapore Mint

The coin design, after being approved, is first made into a plaster mould (right), before being converted into a rubber mould (middle) and then subsequently into an epoxy mould (far right).









2 Engravers help to touch up the design after it is transferred from the mould to the working die.



Meanwhile, the blank coins, which are either bought from overseas or produced by the mint itself, are being buffed to a shine with a machine.



4 The blank coin is checked and cleaned a final time by hand before the design is pressed onto the coin.





5 The worker places the coins, one after another, into the machine which stamps the design.



6 Final product: The Singapore Mint is known for its workmanship in producing intricate designs on commemorative coins, such as this for Bhutan.
