Capacity of Copenhagen's Parken Stadium, the smallest venue. Up to 11,250 fans will be let in for each of the four games to be staged there.

87,000

Capacity of London's Wembley Stadium, the largest of the 11 venues for Euro 2020. A maximum of 22,500 fans will be allowed to attend each of the seven games.
