Kevin Poulsen AKA Dark Dante, Hacked into Los Angeles phone networks to ensure he won a prize from a radio show, and several other mischief-making hacks. Went to prison in the early '90s and is now a contributing editor at Wired.

The Syrian Electronic Army Unleashes distributed denial of service (DDoS) attacks and spams social media like Twitter and Facebook **Targets Western-leaning** Syria-opposing organisations.



Max Ray "Iceman" Butler Stole two million credit card numbers and ran up over US\$86 million in fraudulent charges. Arrested in 2007. now serving 13-year sentence.



Astra Infiltrated the computers of the French aviation company Dassault Group, stole weapons technology data which he sold to numerous countries over five years. Caught in 2008.



Vladimir Levin Broke into Citibank's computers in 1995, allegedly stole nearly US\$10 million by re-wiring it to various global accounts. Sentenced to three years in prison and ordered to pay back US\$240,000 to Citibank.



Kevin Mitnick Stole code from companies including Sun Microsystems and Novell, admitted to hacking into US National Security Agency phone calls. Pleaded guilty in 1995 to

fraud, served five years.

Now works as a professional security consultant.
