It is estimated that Qatar has spent that much to prepare for the World Cup, nearly 10 times more than what Russia spent in 2018. This is largely because Oatar built seven new stadiums from scratch.

Most World Cup trophies Brazil (5)

The Samba Kings are

the most successful team in World Cup history, winning in 1958, 1962, 1970, 1994 and 2002.

Top scorer

Miroslav Klose (16)

The German striker scored 16 times in 24 appearances across four World Cups (2002, 2006, 2010 and 2014)

Most goals scored in a match

Switzerland vs Austria (1954)

The highest-scoring World Cup match took place in June 1954, when Austria beat Switzerland 7-5 in a thriller in Lausanne.

Most goals scored by a player in a single tournament Just Fontaine (1958)

The French forward was at his best at the 1958 World Cup, scoring 13 goals

in just six matches.

Oldest player

Essam El Hadary

(45 years, 161 days)

This Egyptian goalkeeper broke the record when he started his country's final group match against Saudi Arabia at the 2018 World Cup.

Oldest hat-trick scorer

Cristiano Ronaldo

(33 years, 130 days)

Portugal and Spain battled each other to a 3-3 draw in 2018, and the man who bagged the headlines was Ronaldo thanks to his three goals.



Youngest winner

Pele (17 years, 249 davs)

Brazil's most famous son was still a teenager when he helped his country win the World Cup in 1958.

Most clean sheets

Peter Shilton, Fabian Barthez

Two goalkeepers share this impressive record. England's Shilton achieved the feat from 1982 to 1990, while France's Barthez did so between 1998 and 2006.

Most minutes played

Paolo Maldini (2,217)

The Italian left-back played in four World Cups from 1990 to 2002, racking up the most number of minutes on the pitch by any player to date.



Qatar will be the last World Cup to feature 32 teams before the tournament expands to 48 teams in 2026.

1.2 million

An estimated 1.2 million fans are expected to visit the nation during the World Cup. This number equates to almost 40 per cent of Qatar's population.

us\$206

The cheapest tickets for the World Cup final on Dec 18 at the Lusail Stadium cost US\$206, but they will likely be sold for multiples of that on the black market.

Qatar expects the World Cup to boost its economy to the tune of US\$17 billion, down from its previous estimate of US\$20 billion.
